# Dear NFSPS Poets,

The NFSPS Bylaws, Article I, Section B, start off with: "The NFSPS was organized in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, October 17, 1959." Over 64 years ago, a gathering of poets from ten different states committed themselves to create a national poetry organization. Their aspiration for future generations of poets is embedded in the NFSPS mission: "exclusively educational and literary" so as "to unite poets in the bonds of fellowship and understanding." As of April 2024, we are their descendants, a federation of 32 state poetry societies with approximately 3,600 members, all of us in our

individual ways attempting to live up to our organization's founding mission. Alone, each of us is quite limited in what we can accomplish, whereas together, we can promote the NFSPS ideals of education in the craft of writing poetry, lift the quality of what we write by helping one another, come to know more poets from outside our local areas, and through the voices in poems we share, hear of the human experience outside of our own lives. For me, the "together" feels so much more enjoyable as compared to before I joined the Utah State Poetry Society. Likely, many of you feel the same for the state society you joined with its wide diversity of poets and poetry activities.

Now to the business at hand: the 2022-2024 NFSPS Board term will come to an end on June 30<sup>th</sup>. Delegates from our state poetry societies who attend the June 5-9 convention in Roswell, Georgia, will vote in a new slate of ten Elective Board members. As the presiding NFSPS President, I will hand over the ceremonial gavel to the newly elected 36th NFSPS President. This new President and the other Elective Board members, with support from the many Appointive Board members, will lead NFSPS into our shared future. I plan to continue supporting NFSPS in whatever role is most needed as long as I have health (and am wanted!).

Each outgoing President has looked back on what hopes and plans we had for NFSPS during our term and, after taking stock, realize we made much less progress on initiatives we championed. For my start in July 2022, I focused on expanding NFSPS support for:

- 1. **Performance poetry** with the creation of the new Appointive Board role of Performance Poetry Advocate, with Kevin Campbell (aka, Noir Jente) to lead this effort. I have to say Noir has wonderfully exceeded my expectations in organizing our national slam competitions, from the Daytona Beach Shores, Florida, slam in October 2022, to the June 2023 slam in West Des Moines, Iowa, to the upcoming slam this June at the Roswell convention. Noir has led this effort with the help of many volunteers, along with support from NFSPS Board members, especially 1st Vice President Joe Cavanaugh.
- 2. Learning Central, a new initiative, was intended to become an online resource for sharing good organizational practices. These good practices would exist in the form of written procedures by societies that had been successful in addressing common challenges such as ways to increase membership, youth programs, grant writing. The list of what practices could be helpful to our societies is practically endless. In addition, Learning Central

could also host resources for good practices in the art of writing poetry. Sadly, Learning Central is still in its gestational phase. It is still more dream than reality.

As to the state societies that make up NFSPS, over the past two years we had two societies disband (Louisiana and North Dakota) and one join (Kansas). Yes, we have had a few contacts with poets in states not in our Federation, but none of these have yet matured into a society ready to join us. That said, one poetry group is progressing and has a good chance of becoming a new NFSPS state society soon.

An ongoing challenge for both NFSPS and our state poetry societies is how to replace members who no longer can continue in leadership roles with members who are willing to commit to a full term. This leadership succession issue is just the tip of the iceberg-sized challenge of an aging membership that is not being renewed as fast as we are losing members. If there were easy answers to these two issues of leadership and membership, they would have already been resolved. My sense is that each of us as poets need to make ourselves more visible in our communities. How can someone who might be interested in joining our state poetry society become a member if they never hear of our organization or never meet a poet member who invites them to the society's poetry events? In some sense, each of us can be an ambassador for our organization by putting ourselves into the public arena as a practitioner of the humanizing art of poetry. None of us have to be great poets to do this, just willing to stretch out a hand, perhaps with a poem to share.

There is still the organization leadership challenge of finding volunteers to step up to lead for a term. I have had many "no" replies when asking poets from across NFSPS to consider taking on open roles on the NFSPS Board. Somehow, either these poets have gotten to the point of being burned out from their past leadership roles and/or they have their own poetry projects that leave no room in their schedules for volunteer work. I see this as a cup half-full and a cup half-empty: in my search over the past year I have found volunteers for the NFSPS Board roles of Contest Sponsors/Brochure Chair with Susan Stevens Chambers taking over this role from Julie Cummings, and the Judges Chair role with M. Palowski Moore who has rounded up judges for this year's 53 annual contests. Sadly, we still have the Contest Chair and Youth Chair roles open. I took on the Contest Chair role for this year, otherwise we would not have had winners to report at the Roswell convention. The NFSPS Board as well needs someone to take over the Barbara Stevens Manuscript Competition Chair from Eleanor Berry. She has worked with this competition's 2023 winner, Jessica Barksdale, and 2nd VP Board member Steven Concert as Editor, to publish Jessica's Let's End This Now. Jessica's book will debut at our upcoming convention. As well, Eleanor has secured a highly esteemed judge, Diane Seuss, for the 2024 Barbara Stevens competition. I am sure Eleanor will be happy to advise the new Chair for this competition. Please consider these open Board roles as opportunities to learn, get to know poets outside your circle, and find some satisfaction, even happiness, in giving of your time to other poets and to poetry. # WASHINGTON STATE POET WINS BARBARA STEVENS AWARD

This June the NFSPS will release *Let's End This Now,* a book by Jessica Barksdale of Vancouver, Washington. Her manuscript was selected by Edward Hirsch as the winner of the 2023 Barbara Stevens Poetry Book Manuscript Competition.



Hirsch also recognized five other manuscripts:

- For 2nd place, True Crime, by Juliana Gray of Alfred, NY
- For 3rd place, *The Bodies, No Matter*, by Maura Candela of Garden City, NY
- For honorable mention, *The Beautiful Winding*, by Allen Shadow of Catskill, NY
- For honorable mention, *Seemingly Normal*, by Hilda Weiss of Santa Monica, CA
- For honorable mention, *WORK*, by Patricia Sheppard of Belmont, MA

Jessica Barksdale has published two previous poetry collections, *When We Almost Drowned* (2019) and *Grim Honey* (2021). Her sixteenth novel, *What the Moon Did*, was published February 2023 by Flexible Press, and her short story collection, *Trick of the Porch Light*, in September 2023 by Mouthfeel Press. She has been nominated for eight Pushcart Prizes in poetry, fiction, and nonfiction.

Jessica taught at Diablo Valley College in Pleasant Hill, California, and continues to teach for UCLA Extension and in the online MFA program for Southern New Hampshire University.

Edward Hirsch said this about Jessica's manuscript:

Let's End This Now is a courageous, haunted, bracingly honest book. In these stylistically spare and emotionally unsparing poems, a woman confronts the hard truths of her own life. She will not look away from her complicated experiences as a sister and daughter, a wife and mother, and states things, often against herself, that others would not say. The result is an unremitting, utterly trustworthy, and unforgettable testament.

The speaker in many of the poems in this collection is the lyrical "I." Two poems that particularly demonstrate the strength of this work are "My Dead Father and I Talk in the Bathroom" and the title poem, "Let's End This Now."

In "My Dead Father and I Talk in the Bathroom," we see a woman confronting the spirit of a father too often missing from her life, and dealing with the aftermath of his death, along with unwelcome signs of her own aging:

...me a woman with graying hair in one place and too much hair in another, me still and always a fifteen-year-old girl, looking into a mirror and seeing only herself. My father nods, hands me the tweezers.

In "Let's End This Now," she explores the difficulties of a different kind of troubled relationship:

...See me clinging and sad, and he, afraid and pathological. Note all the ensuing therapy,

this a desperate rebound after a long marriage. But instead of that story, let's end this now, the killer holding his breath,

plan right on schedule as we open the cabin door.

NFSPS Second Vice-President Steven Concert is editing and designing *Let's End This Now*, working closely with Jessica to have the book released in time for this year's NFSPS Convention.

Jessica entered the Barbara Stevens Competition as a non-member, but she has received a one-year complimentary membership in the Oregon Poetry Association as part of her award. She will attend the 2024 NFSPS Convention in Roswell, Georgia, and read from her new book there. Copies will be for sale at a discounted convention price, and she will be available to sign them.

#### FELLOWSHIPS HELP WITH COSTS OF ATTENDING CONVENTION

NFSPS Conventions are a wonderful opportunity to connect with poets from all over the country, and attending in person provides a far richer experience than Zoom. Informal conversations, unscheduled get-togethers to share poems, one-on-one chats with presenters-these and many other rewarding encounters are only possible at the in-person gathering. However, the travel and hotel challenging prohibitive. costs can be or That barrier to attendance is what Convention Attendance Fellowships are intended to overcome. Instituted during the 2014-2016 Board term, they have been offered every year since, except for 2020, when the Convention was canceled because of the COVID pandemic, and 2021, when it was entirely virtual. They are funded by the NFSPS portion of profits, if any, from the prior year's Convention, plus what can be prudently drawn from the General Fund.

Although they can't cover full costs for anyone, they can supplement travel budgets by a few hundred dollars. If such a supplement might enable you to attend the 2024 Convention in person, do consider applying for a fellowship. The more members that attend, the more valuable the Convention can be for everyone.

Applications for this year's Convention Attendance Fellowships are now available online at https://nfsps.net/. All members of affiliated state societies are eligible to apply EXCEPT those who received fellowships for the past two consecutive years. The deadline for applying is April 21. We're aiming to notify applicants by April 30.

A Cave Canem fellow, Watering Hole graduate fellow and Scioto Retreat Cohort, Ed is a Pushcart nominee and was commissioned to craft a speech encompassing the Freedom Award recipients for 2017-2022 for the National Civil Rights Museum. **BARBARA BARRY-NISHANIAN**, affectionately known as "Miss Joycine" in Macon, Georgia, was awarded the "Southern Women's Achievement Award" for the state of Georgia in New York City. In the early 1960s, she applied for a job that was only open to men at The New York Times but didn't get it. However, she won the heart of the firm's Vice President and married him, and they have been together for 58 years and have one son.

Barbara's determination to defy societal expectations and her exceptional qualities led her to become the President of GPS at the age of 86. She retired as the owner of Joycines, Art, Attitude & Accessory Gallery in 2003 but launched Macon's inaugural "First Friday." In 2016, due to a dying request of her childhood friend, Barbara ventured into the world of poetry and gained international recognition. Her life reflects a legacy of spirituality, creativity, courage, and leadership.

**CALEB** "THE NEGRO ARTIST" **RAINEY**, is an author, performer, and producer. His debut book, Look, Black Boy, was awarded first prize in the North Street Book Prize, and his second book, Heart Notes was published in 2019. He released two spoken word albums and in 2023, as a part of the Brucemore Artisan in Studio program, Caleb produced his first short film, Willing to Grow. He is the winner of several slams across the United States, and competed in the 2023 UNESCO Slam-0-Vision global poetry slam where he ranked 7th worldwide. When he is not writing and performing, he is actively curating a community of spoken word poets in Iowa City through his high school program, IC Speaks, and producing events like the Mic Check Poetry Fest.

**IHOR PAVLYUK** is a Ukrainian poet, writer, teacher, and translator. He earned his Ph.D. in Social Communication. He was named People's Poet of Ukraine in 2020. He is an English Pen Award and Switzerland Literary Prize winner. His works have been translated into Russian, Belarusian, Polish, English, French, Chinese, Latvian, Bulgarian, Japanese and Italian. He was nominated for the Nobel Prize in Literature by the National Federation of State Poetry Societies for 2024.

As the People's Poet of Ukraine, he reminds Ukrainians of the strength and power of their past history and urges them to see their future with hope, dignity, and power. His appearance at this year's NFSPS Convention follows a tour of the United States where he used his poetry to convey the difficulties his country faces as a result of the Russian invasion and helped raise funds to help the evergrowing number of orphans in Ukraine.
